The Lexton League Best & Fairest award was won by Amphitheatre's Mel Morley with 24 votes.

Mel started his football as a Junior with Avoca in 1944.

Tragically, Mel died only a young man. Years later his son Greg, Played with Avoca.

When <u>Ken Boots</u> was appointed coach in 1951, it soon became obvious that the sleeping Bulldog was beginning to stir at last.

Twenty-eight year old Boots was recruited from Traralgon, but prior to that he was a star footballer with Glenelg in South Australia.

Boots, who was paid 170 pounds, or \$340.00 for the season, came to Avoca with a huge reputation to live up to.

However, he quickly proved he was exactly the tonic the doctor had ordered. His experience, and vast talent, provided inspiration for Avoca's youth, which suddenly blossomed like a wattle tree in the spring.

From the bottom of the ladder the previous season, Avoca clawed its way to 12 victories and respectability.

However, the first semi final against Lexton proved the stumbling block for the 1951 season, with Avoca losing by 47 points.

Ken Boots won the Best & Fairest Award with 16 votes from Jim McKenzie who polled 10 votes.

Alby Wright kicked 24 goals to win the goal kicking from Noel Jess with 17 goals. And Robert and John Jolly with 16 goals.

Noel Jess was not only developing as a good footballer, he also proved his versatility by winning the quoit competition.

Meanwhile the amazing battle for supremacy between Navarre and Waubra continued, with Navarre scoring a four point victory over its rivals in the Grand Final.

With Ken Boots at the helm as Coach, Avoca's bank of talent continued to mature in 1952.

The opposition was simply far too good on the day, with Avoca losing by 47 points. But the experience would prove invaluable for the young Bulldogs.

Ken Boots edged out Bill Gollop, Noel Jess and Kevin Harrison in the Best & Fairest award. Jim McKenzie topped the goalkicking with 17 goals.

Whilst the Avoca players enjoyed the long hot summer, club officials were taking stock and carefully analyzing the talent available.

The Office Bearers were elected:

Committee: Keith Astbury, Murray Proctor, Jack Coghlan, Eric Hedge, Les Williams, Bill Stewart, Bill Barker.

The committee believed that they had the foundations of a premiership team, but it lacked a couple of top players.

Their sights were set on a coach named <u>Jock McDougall</u>, but the dilemma facing the committee was how to avoid offending the incumbent coach and champion footballer, Ken Boots.

To his enormous credit, Boots not only accepted the demotion but continued to play brilliant football.

Avoca suffered only two defeats for the season and, when they crushed Navarre in the second semi final by 38 points, the premiership pennant was all but hanging from the flag pole in high street.

For the two weeks leading up to the Grand final, Avoca was buzzing like never before. It had been more than a quarter of a century since they had seen a premiership pennant.

A large crown arrived at Lexton for the ultimate showdown.

With Ian Grant performing sheer magic in front of the big sticks, Avoca held a handy five goal lead at half time. Typically, Navarre staged a gutsy comeback in the third term.

With the margin just 19 points, it was still anyone's game as they started the last quarter.

Gradually Navarre pegged back the lead, but the Avoca boys were playing like men possessed.

When the final bell pealed out above the roar of the crowd, the scoreboard showed Avoca was victorious by eight points.

Whilst Avoca spent the summer months basking in the sea of glory of its new found success, the symptoms of a premiership hangover began to emerge when the new season opened for business.

The club appointed top Murtoa footballer, Jack Baker, as Captain and Coach

However, the departure of Ken Boots and Noel Jess proved to be a big handicap. Both had been key players in Avoca's rise to power.

John Bowen(pictured), Mike Cleary and Bill Gollop were all selected in the Lexton League side.

Despite his brilliant form, Ian Grant was named emergency for the representative team, with the full forward spot being filled by Frank Driscoll.

The Navarre spearhead kicked 127 goals for the season, and was instrumental in his side winning the premiership.

lan Grant still retrained his grip on the limelight, by booting 11 goals in one match and nine on two other occasions.

Grant finished the season with 87 goals, a remarkable effort, considering Avoca failed to make the finals.

He also coached the junior side during the final series.

Avoca's Best & Fairest award was won by Mike Cleary, ahead of Jim McKenzie and John Jolly.

Aged just 25 years, Ian Grant was appointed Avoca's coach in 1955.

The season was very much a carbon copy of the previous year, with the Bulldogs finishing in fifth position.

Grant and John Bowen were both selected in the Lexton League side. A bag of six goals ensured Grant was named as on the League's best players.

Mike Cleary and veteran Bill Gollop tied for the club's Best & Fairest award.

Bill finished third in the League count behind Navarre champion Col Bibby, who polled 30 votes to win the coveted award.

Avoca stalwart Kevin Lindsay, received a certificate of appreciation, acknowledging his long and distinguished service to the club, whilst Kevin Harrison was voted Best Clubman and Most Popular Player by the supporters.

The appointment of <u>Alan Streeter</u> as coach brought a breath of fresh air to the club.

Paid a salary of 300 pounds, or \$600, he set an intense fitness program and drove himself as hard as he did the players.

Streeter played 45 games with Carlton before transferring to VFA club Oakleigh in 1951.

He won their Best & Fairest award and was also instrumental in their VFA premiership victory. Before joining Avoca, he played with Kyneton, Charlton and Donald.

The enthusiasm generated by Streeter was contagious and suddenly Avoca was back in finals contention.

It seemed as though Ian Grant had found the fountain of youth. Despite his years he turned on several remarkable performances in the goal square.

On 28 April, 1956, he booted 12 goals against Amphitheatre to equal a record set by the great Paddy Ryan Junior 22 years earlier.

On 7 July, 1956, he kicked 10 of Avoca's 12 goals in a match against Beaufort.

For an encore, he then snared bags of nine goals twice, to top the leading goalkicking with 80 goals.

Seven Avoca players were selected in the Lexton League side: Alan Streeter, Jim McKenzie, Bill Gollop, Ian Grant, John Bowen, Kevin Harrison and John Jolly.

After finishing third on the ladder, Avoca faced up to Moonambel in the first semi final, and scored a convincing 26 point victory.

The preliminary final against Navarre was a remarkable game of football.

Avoca held their opponents goalless until half time.

Navarre then staged a stunning recovery in the third quarter, kicking five goals, and at the last change the margin was just six points.

Incredibly, both sides failed to score a goal in the final quarter, but Navarre booted five behinds compared to Avoca's two behinds, giving Navarre a memorable nine point victory.



The mercurial <u>Bill Gollop</u> was appointed Coach in 1957. Although the big ruckman was nearing the twilight of his career, the appointment was fitting reward for 12 years of dedicated service.

Free of the pressures of coaching, <u>Alan Streeter</u> became an even better player.

The 27 year old was simply breathtaking, and an automatic selection in the Lexton League side.

Streeter became such a hot favourite to win the League's Best player award, that SP bookmakers stopped taking bets before the season was half over.

Standing just five feet eight inches, the gutsy little rover was true to form and polled 29 ½ votes from 14 games, to create history by becoming the first Avoca footballer to win the Lexton league Best & Fairest award.

Unfortunately the season ended for Alan and Avoca the following week, when they lost the first semi final to Moonambel by 29 points.

Despite his 33 years, Bill Gollop won the club Best & Fairest award and finished third to Navarre's Jack Bibby in the Lexton League Best player award.

Once again Navarre and Waubra fought out the grand final, with Navarre winning easily.

And even before the 1959 season kicked off, the football club was again struggling desperately.

Typical to his nature, <u>Bill Gollop</u> agreed to coach the side in an honorary capacity.

Undoubtedly the club would have folded, if not for Bill's gesture.

Needless to say, the season held little joy.

The club hit rock bottom on 8th August, 1959, when it kicked a record low score against Beaufort.
