The dawn of the seventies heralded a whole new era for the Bulldogs.

After watching Natte Bealiba and Lexton methodically construct powerful football teams, Avoca realised they would have to follow similar guidelines if they were to be competitive.

Under the leadership of its President, John Field, the club pulled off a huge recruiting coup by signing former Maryborough and Ballarat League Champion, Terry Long.

Although he was approaching the twilight of his career, Terry's influence on the players far exceeded the club's wildest expectations.

As a coach, there have been none better and none more respected.

Gradually he moulded the team together and introduced them to the play on style of football that was suddenly in vogue.

Avoca finished the season third, but lost the first semi final by 42 points Lexton.

Brian Coghlan won the club Best & Fairest, whilst Gary McKenzie was Best Under 20and Ken Hall Best Under 18.

It was fine year for 18 year old Ken Hall, who also topped the goal kicking with 25 goals, but, tragically, a knee injury would later frustrate his ambitions.

Although he was only 15 years of age. Jim Jess was now a regular member of the senior team and booted 21 goals for the season.

After many years in the seniors, Alf Hunter easily won the Reserves Best & Fairest.

Mark Drummond won the Under 15 Best & Fairest from Alan Murphy and Geoff Drummond. Richard Field won the Most Determined award.

Terry Long and Gary McKenzie were selected in the Lexton League side.

Natte Bealiba won back-to-back premierships, beating Lexton by 31 points.

<u>Terry Long</u>, who worked a farm near Maryborough, was proving to be the perfect coach, a courageous and respected footballer, and an astute football brain.

It came as no surprise when Terry was appointed captain of the Lexton Football League side.

<u>Jim Jess</u>, aged just 16 years, was also selected in the league team, whilst Geoff and Mark Drummond, Phil Holland and Dale Gothard were selected in the league's Under 15 team.

Peter Jess proved to be the recruit of the year, booting 54 goals and finishing runner up by just one vote to Howard Locket in the Lexton League Best & Fairest award.

Ironically, the man who is now renowned for the million dollar contracts he negotiates for his clients, played with Avoca for no remuneration.

A budding young journalist, named Stephen Phillips, was also enticed to Avoca.

During his youth Steve often spent school holidays at Avoca staying with his relations, Bill and Connie Robinson.

By working at The Age and Sun newspapers, Steve established himself as one of Australia's foremost sports reporters, and then carved an enviable career in the television industry which took him around the world and to several Olympic Games.

He was a key member of the 1971 team but at the end of the season, had to choose between playing football and concentrating on his career.

Although the Bulldogs finished second on the ladder, they were beaten twice during the season by Lexton.

Terry Long knew if his boys were to have any real chance of winning the premiership, they had to turn on a convincing performance against Lexton in the Second Semi Final.

And perform they did, In a thrilling match Avoca led until moments before the final siren, when the Tigers leveled the scores for a draw.

Although the team was jubilant in the knowledge that they could match it with Lexton, the club was shattered later that night when

brilliant rover Peter Jess was badly injured in a motor vehicle accident.

Peter, who had been the life blood of the side, lost the sight of an eye.

The tragedy seemed to inspire the team, who won the replay of the second semi final by 31 points.

Avoca won enormous respect for the spirit they displayed after the tragic loss of Peter Jess from the team.

However, the absence of a player with the caliber and experience of Peter proved a big handicap in the final analysis, with Lexton winning the Grand Final by 12 points.

However, the reigning premiers, Lexton, had not been idle over the summer and again emerged as the team to beat, and became stronger as the season grew.

Dale Farnsworth and Mark Drummond were selected in the Under 15 LFL Under 19 team, whilst Geoff Drummond and Phil Holland were picked to represent the LFL Under 16 team.

Seventeen year old Jim Jess featured in the individual highlight of the season. After being switched from Full back to Full Forward in a match against Amphitheatre, Jim proceeded to boot 16 goals to smash the Lexton league record set two weeks prior by Landsborough's Laurie Ploughman with 14 goals.

After finishing in second position, Avoca were quickly brought back to size when they were overwhelmed by Lexton in the second semi final.

After three inspiring years Terry Long stood down as coach, making way for David Ross, who worked at the National Bank.

Ironically, Terry Long's form was brilliant, but it turned out to be a dismal season for Avoca seniors. Who finished in eighth position.

Terry Long won the club's Best & Fairest award from Keith Chiswell.

Both were selected in the Lexton league side, together with Neville Field and David Ross, who also topped the club's goal kicking with 27 goals.

The Reserves Best & Fairest was a cliffhanger.

Richard Field won on a count-back from Greg Curtis, who also took out the Under 15's Best & Fairest trophy.

Whilst there was little joy for the Bulldog's senior team, it was a memorable year for the Under 15's.

Coached by John Field, the side was undefeated throughput the season and thrashed Moonambel in the Grand Final to win the premiership by 78 points.

Over the years bank employees have contributed enormously to the Avoca Football Club, on and off the field.

In 1974 the Manager of the State Bank, Jack D'Arcy, replaced David Ross as coach, but the season was virtually a carbon copy of 1973.

Whilst former coach, Terry Long played superb football and the senior team languished on the bottom of the ladder, the under 15's again cruised through the season undefeated.

Wayne Veitch became the first Avoca player to win the Lexton league Under 15 Best & Fairest award.

He polled a massive 35 votes, and was also selected to play in the Victorian Schoolboy's Championships.

Avoca Under 15's cored a total of 191 goals and 197 behinds for the season, whilst only 18 goals and 15 behinds were recorded against them. Little wonder the percentage was 1188.5%

The young bulldog pups held the opposition scoreless on nine occasions.

Predictably, the Grand Final was a walk over, with Avoca winning by 62 points, giving coach John Field back-to-back premierships and a remarkable record.

After two years in the wilderness, Avoca was determined to reermerge.

With the support of an enthusiastic committee, President, Ken Field and Secretary, John Field, went on a recruiting drive.

Former top Ballarat League player Greg Dowd was appointed coach.

Also amongst club ranks were four former coach's in Terry Long, Dave Ross, Jack D'Arcy and Bluey Marshall, an ex Maryborough champion ruckman who was persuaded to return to Avoca.

Avoca was also bolstered by several Amphitheatre players when their club disbanded.

The retirement of former coach's Ray Marshall, David Ross, Jack D'Arcy and the great terry Long created a void in the club's bank of experienced players.

However, former local Gary McKenzie did not hesitate when offered the job of coaching Avoca.

Although the seniors finished fifth, several young players staked a claim for a permanent place in the team, including Geoff and Peter Drummond, Gary Coghlan, Peter Blair, Jack Wardlaw, John Jess and Wayne & David Veitch.

In the Under 15's a pint sized 12 year old kid named David Edwards was starting to turn heads.

Interestingly, it was these and other young locals who would form the nucleus that would soon project the Bulldogs into on the club's most successful era's ever.

However, 1976 was still a case of experience winning through, with 28 year old Brian Coghlan taking out the club's Best & Fairest award from Geoff Drummond, who was also the club's leading goal kicker with 40 goals.

Brian and Geoff also represented Avoca in the Lexton league side, together with George Wardlaw and Allan Wallace.

Brian finished runner up in the Lexton league Best & fairest voting, five votes behind Lexton's Julian Kaye, who polled seven first votes for 21 votes.

It was some consolation for Brian to become the first Avoca player to win the Maffescioni trophy.

Ron Verlin won the Reserves Club Best & Fairest from Greg Morley.

The Reserves were unlucky to be eliminated in the fist semi final, losing to Navarre by six points.

The 1977 season started disastrously for Avoca.

On the eve of the first game, an appeal to win a clearance from St Arnaud for new coach, Kevin Adams, was refused.

Former Maryborough District League footballer, Bob :Fiddle" Evans, a Telecom technician, took over the reins.

Although Avoca finished fifth, the club continued with its policy to blood promising young players.

Geoff Drummond became the second Avoca footballer to win the Maffescioni award and was also the club's leading goalkicker with 35 goals.

Former Avoca player and all time champion, Ron Field, returned home and won the club Best & Fairest award, edging out Geoff Drummond.

Other award winners included Dale Templeton, Michael Barker, Wayne Veitch Best Under 20, and Peter Drummond Best Under 18.

The Best Clubman award went to Kevin Matthews, who has continued to serve the club loyally over the years.

Following a count-back, Keith Johnson won the Reserves Best & fairest award from Bruce Farnsworth.

Keith was not so fortunate in the Lexton league equivalent, finishing runner up to Lexton's Garry Sargent.

The Reserves season ended after losing the first semi final to Lexton by 24 points.

On reflection, the Education Department was indirectly responsible for the revival Avoca eventually underwent at the turn of the decade.

For many years, Geoff Calder, a school teacher, had given Natte-Bealiba outstanding service.

When he came to work and live in Avoca in 1978, his football loyalties also transferred.

Although he was classed as a good reserves footballer, it soon became obvious his expertise was administration.

Although he did not become an official until the following year, it was 1978 when Geoff started work on a recruiting blueprint that would ultimately build Avoca into a football power.

Geoff played a key role in enticing several top young players from Ballarat Teachers College.


