Under the leadership of President Ken Beavis and Geoff Calder, the club was maturing on and off the filed.

Although the senior team finished third on the ladder, coach Ron Deledio brought them to their peak with perfect timing, eliminating Navarre by 67 points in the first semi final.

During the short break, coach Ron Deledio took time to calm his charges, and they listened.

After seizing the lead in the second quarter, Avoca methodically took control of the match, running out victorious by 31 points, in what is now known as the first of the drought breaking premierships.

When dual premiership coach Ron Deledio left Avoca, former Maryborough player Adrian Jacobs had big shoes to fill when he accepted the coaching job.

But Adrian, a school teacher, rose to the occasion, and along with Peter Drummond, David Edwards and Gerard Darcy, was selected in the Lexton League team.

Adrian and Peter Drummond were amongst Lexton's best players.

1982 will be remembered as the year long-standing individual records tumbled.

Gerard Darcy became the first Avoca player to kick 100 goals in a season. More info on following link. (Gerard Darcy)

The gutsy Rover's tally of 115 included a new club record of 22 goals in one game.

Earlier in the season, John Jess kicked 16 goals from the half forward flank to equal the club record set by his brother, Jim Jess in 1972.

Playing against Moonambel on May 8, 1982, Avoca kicked a club and league record score of 57.23.365 to 3.3.21

To top of the home and away part of the season, David Edwards won the Maffescioni Award.

But that is where Avoca's good fortune seemed to run out.

After finishing second on the ladder, Avoca received a hiding from Navarre in the second semi final.

Following two of the most successful years in the Bulldog's history, the main office bearers all decided it was time to give others the opportunity to lead the club, and stepped aside at the annual meeting.

Daryl Edwards, a stock and station agent with Elders, was appointed senior coach, Shane Clohesy was reserves coach, and Leon Bradley had charge of the Under 16's.

Although Avoca seniors finished the season a disappointing sixth and the Reserves seventh, there were many memorable performances by individual's during the year.

Playing against Moonambel, Darren Curtis bagged 14 goals, whilst David Veitch kicked 10 in the same match.

John Jess booted tallies of eight goals twice, and nine on one occasion.

Richard Field and Graeme Alexander both kicked eight goals each against Moonambel.

Richard Field, Leon Bradley and David Veitch were all selected in the Lexton league Side.

Richard Field wrote his name in Lexton League History for all time when he polled 21 votes to share the Best & Fairest award with Lexton's Steve Kirby.

Avoca boys also shone in the League's Under 16 Best & Fairest Count.

With a massive 32 votes, Craig (Bill) Drummond, won the award, eight votes clear of Greg Wardlaw, who was equal Runner-Up with Neil Robinson of Natte-Bealiba.

Avoca's Senior Best & Fairest was Richard Field,

Scott Lewis won the Reserves B & F and Greg Wardlaw won the Under 16's.

John Jess topped the club goalkicking with 50 goals.

Shane Clohesy was voted the Best Clubman.

Although the Under 16's team finished on top of the ladder, they were eliminated from the finals when they lost to Dunolly by 16 points in the Preliminary Final.

Over Summer, Avoca cleared its best player of the previous season, Richard Field, to Montrose, but regained the services of <u>David Edwards</u>, who was now widely regarded as a champion footballer in country ranks.

Joining David were top players in Tony Wines, Peter Drummond and Max Brown.

Under the guidance of Coach Daryl Edwards in his second season with the club, and with David Edwards back ion the engine room, Avoca was again back in business.

Individual highlights included nine goals kicked by Norm Jacobsen against Landsborough, whilst David Edwards booted eight goals against Natte-Bealiba and also topped the club tally for the season with 51 goals.

After finishing in fourth spot, Avoca met Marnoo in the first semi final.

In controversial circumstances, Avoca were beaten by five points.

On the siren, David Veitch kicked what would have been the match winning goal, but the umpire penalised him for running too far.

Winds of change were again blowing through the club at the beginning of 1987.

For some time it had been obvious that Avoca would have to become more professional, if it were to compete seriously.

The Annual Meeting voted to streamline the club's administration.

The traditional committee was a replaced with a Board of Management, which included:

President: John Field

Vice-President: John Farnsworth

Secretary: Ross Dawson

Treasurer: Brian Arrowsmith

Board Members: Doug Pridham. David Veitch, Hugh Edwards.

The plan had plenty of merit in theory, and had been successfully adopted by clubs in other competitions, but it placed enormous pressure on the individuals.

Also, outside AFL ranks, the lifeblood of football clubs is the voluntary worker.

No matter how minor, their contribution can never be underestimated and, if football clubs are to survive and thrive, then they can not afford to alienate anyone.

Whilst other clubs persevered with the new style of administration, Avoca reverted back to office bearers and an open committee in 1990.

However, the seeds had been sown, and it was just a matter of time before the football club would benefit from its endeavors to become more professional and competitive.

Colin Edwards, from Ararat, was appointed Senior Coach, Tony Stephenson took on the Reserves Coaching position and Geoff Calder had charge of the Under 16's.

Avoca suffered a severe blow when Craig Lallard broke his leg during round 11 and was sidelined for the season. As a youngster Craig had shown great potential as a forward, and with 37 goals was the leading goal kicker in the Lexton League when misfortune struck.

1987 seemed to be the year the umpires got twitchy.

Incredibly, Greg Corcoran was reported for striking an unknown Marnoo reserves player. Needless to say, the charge was not proved.

In a more serious vein, Richard Field was booked for repeatedly kicking.

He was found not guilty on that charge, but suspended for one week for striking.

Others booked and suspended included Robert Redpath – five matches, Robert Fraser – one match and Tony Stephenson – one match for abusive language.

The year held few performance highlights for the Bulldogs, although Michael Coghlan was selected in the Lexton Football League rep side.

The senior's Best & Fairest award was won by Peter Jolly, with lan Fraser Runner Up.

Tony Slater won the Reserves Best & Fairest, whilst David Field took out the Under 16's B & F.

For the third time, Ross Dawson was voted Best Clubman.

The efforts to make a more professional club overall started to reap dividends in 1988.

Peter Tuohey, a stock and station agent with Elders, was appointed coach and, although several good players were cleared, the club offset this with vigorous recruiting.

The Bulldogs stocks were boosted enormously with the return of David Edwards, already recognized as one of Avoca's best postwar footballers.
